The finished product is a place where children and adults alike can explore decks and bridges, and learn from the educational material provided in the covered house. On that beautiful Saturday in May, following a ribbon cutting by Spirit of Alexandria co-founder Jim Bartel and Director of Wildlife and Outreach for Howell Nature Center Dana DeBenham, the crowd rushed the treehouse with enthusiasm and excitement. To see adults, men and women of all ages, alongside their children, all laughing and jumping up and down on a suspension bridge is an experience only a space as whimsical as this could provide.

The Treehouse needed a bit of art, so each child was asked to paint a masterpiece on a block of wood to be added to the walls. The main event - for the kids, at least - was a duck race down the Nature Scape water feature, located just feet away from the Treehouse. Each child got to pick their favorite rubber duck, from unicorn ducks to ducks with tiger stripes. A lively race down the winding waterfall provided tough competition, and for those of us watching, endless entertainment.

The final piece to the Treehouse is, as seen below in the arms of Bartel, a cut out of a little girl on a swing. Spirit of Alexandria Vice-President, Craig Bennett, was in a race car accident weeks before the Grand Opening. This tragic turn of events unfortunately prevented Leah Bennett, President, and Craig from being able to attend this event. It was decided that when Craig, still wheelchair-bound and in recovery, is ready and able to walk he and Leah will place the little girl on the swing below the sign of the Treehouse to forever sway in the wind.
